Parallels between 1 Corinthians 1:17 – 18 and 2 Corinthians 2:14 – 16a.

Paul's ministry and message were one; what Paul could say about the cross of Christ in 1 Corinthians 1:17-18, he could reaffirm about his own life as an apostle in 2 Corinthians 2:14-16. Hence, as the "aroma of Christ," Paul's suffering brings about the same twofold effect caused by his proclamation of the cross: death and life.
