FORTY-ONE specifically about the Holy Spirit

"... there are two influences operating for our good in our probationary life, and not three. The two are the Word of God – the spirit-word – and the angelic ministration in providence. There is no third one ..."

"Repentance and forgiveness of sins" is to be preached "in his name to all nations, beginning in Jerusalem."

"You are witnesses of these things. I am going to end you what my Father has promised ... "

ACTS 2: The Day of Pentecost

Note #1

What they heard was like the blowing of a violent wind and what they saw seemed to be tongues of fire

Note #2

They were "filled with the Holy Spirit" and were enabled by the Spirit to speak in other tongues.

ACTS 2.33

- 1.Jesus was exalted to the right hand of God
- 2.He received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit (KJV, NASB etc. = the promise of the Holy Spirit)
- 3. Jesus poured out what you now see and hear

ACTS 2.38-39

ACTS 4.13 and 31

ACTS 6: The Choosing of the Seven

Stephen was:

- full of faith and the Holy Spirit (6.5)
- full of God's grace and power (6.8)
- a match for his opponents who could not stand up against his wisdom or the Spirit by whom [which] he spoke (6.10)

ACTS 8: Simon the Sorcerer

- was full of self-importance (8.9)
- was acclaimed as being the "Great Power" (8.10)
- he believed and was baptised, but not truly converted(8.19)
- he was still hungry for power (8.19)
- he was "full of bitterness and captive to sin" (8.23)

ACTS 10 and 11: Cornelius

Astonishment that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles (10.45)

"They have received the Holy Spirit just as we have" (10.47; 11.15; 11.17)

ACTS15: The Jerusalem Council

God made a choice ...

God, who knows the heart, showed that he accepted them by giving the Holy Spirit to them, just as he did to us. He made no distinction between us and them, for he purified their hearts by faith.

ACTS 15.8-9

"We have to beware of artificial or superstitious interpretations of the idea of divine guidance. To pray for the inspiration of the Spirit is right, for this is a prayer for the opening of our hearts to the Spirit of love, and for the overcoming of selfishness and apathy that prevent us from pursuing freedom and truth. It is not a prayer for an infusion of supernatural knowledge, or for our reasoning processes to be by-passed and for God's Spirit to make our decisions for us. The misunderstanding that sometimes exists about this is surprising.

GEOFFREY LAMPE: God is Spirit

"God influences us by His word, and the ministry of angels in answer to prayer."

"The angels ... manipulate the circumstances of the lives of God's children to give, in answer to their prayers, the encouragement they need at any time."

God is "active through the ways of providence, working in countless ways to influence our attitude and thinking by the pressure of external circumstances."

PSALM 119

- v10: "do not let me stray from your commandments" - how does the LORD prevent us from straying?
- v18: "open my eyes that I may see wonderful things from your law" how does the Lord open eyes?
- v28: "strengthen me according to your word" how does God strengthen us to live like that?
- v35: "Direct me in the paths of your commands" how does God direct those who delight in His commands?

PSALM 119.176

I have strayed like a lost sheep.
Seek your servant,
For I have not forgotten your commands.
